In 2004 the opera world was taken by storm with a ground-breaking new production of Richard Wagner's *Tristan und Isolde* in Los Angeles, which included a revolutionary four-hour video, specifically created for the opera by Bill Viola. This is the story of the then-Paris Opera director Gerard Mortier, who pushed the boundaries of what opera could be by inviting a trinity of California-based creatives to re-imagine a *Tristan und Isolde* for our times. It was a bold project for the LA Phil, having just opened the now-iconic Frank Gehry-designed Walt Disney Concert Hall, projecting them into the world of music and images. The fully staged opera has since been seen in Paris, Tokyo, Kobe, Toronto and Madrid, with concert versions in Los Angeles, New York, Rotterdam, London, Helsinki, Stockholm, and St Petersburg.
